

RESOLUTION 516

CITY OF LACEY

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF CERTAIN CONTRACTS FOR SOCIAL SERVICES TO THE CITY OF LACEY FOR THE 1982 CALENDAR YEAR

WHEREAS, the city desires to have certain social services performed for its citizens requiring specialized skills and other supportive capabilities; and

WHEREAS, sufficient city resources are not available to provide such services; and

WHEREAS, the agencies set forth in this Resolution represent that they are qualified and possess sufficient skills and necessary capabilities, including technical and professional expertise where required, to perform the services set forth in an attachment to the proposed contract with each agency, attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the health and welfare of the citizens of the City of Lacey that the city enter into contracts for said services pursuant to the terms of this Resolution; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LACEY, WASHINGTON, as follows:

Section 1. That the City of Lacey enter into contracts for the 1982 calendar year with the following non-profit organizations for those specific services required by the proposed contract attached hereto for each of said non-profit organizations at an amount not to exceed the sums set forth as follows:

WORK STATEMENT

1. Services to be provided under contract: Crisis Intervention.

To provide 24 hour telephone crisis intervention by trained volunteer phone workers to a minimum of 14,900 individuals.

To provide 24 hour up-to-date community information and referral by trained volunteer phone workers to a minimum of 4,600 individuals.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract:

Act as a coordinating, support, and technical assistance agency for the provision of and utilization of existing community recreation and social services.

The program shall provide coordination, support, and technical assistance in a "one-shop" fashion so that disabled citizens may access existing community recreation and social services.

The program shall also provide information and assistance to 450 clients through the Community Activities list.

The program shall also provide transportation, and activity fee assistance for community-oriented activities.

The program shall also provide a portion of the staff coordination for Sunshine, a basic skills Saturday program for 150 disabled individuals offered through the Lacey Parks and Recreation Department.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract: Adult diversion.

To provide pre-trial diversion services for 60 adult non-violent first time offenders.

Through cooperation with community programs and agencies, candidates for the program are screened for program entry.

Upon entry into the program, the staff will work to:

1. Assess present abilities and talents.
2. Receive counseling
3. Provide restitution.
4. Identify goals
5. Assist in seeking training.
6. Continued job evaluation and upward mobility.

WORK STATEMENT

1. Support a program which provides basic services (e.g. food, shelter).
2. To maintain and unify adjunct services (including information and referral, coordination, and other means by which people can obtain services.)
3. To ensure that victims of abuse or domestic violence are physically protected and receive needed support services.

The primary objective of this program is to provide free legal advise and representation to low income residents of Thurston County in civil (non-criminal) matters for which private lawyers are unavailable.

Such areas of assistance may include legal assistance in areas of shelter and income benefits, family matters, matters of domestic violence or sexual abuse and medical assistance and benefits.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract:

Provide direct aid to victims of domestic and sexual violence.

A. Women's Shelter Services

The purpose of this project is to provide services to women in crisis and to their children. Services will include emergency housing, emergency child care, para-professional counseling by trained staff members, which are to be provided by the project. Other services, such as financial assistance or job referrals, are expected to be obtained by the project from other local agencies.

"Women in crisis" will primarily include women suffering from physical and/or emotional abuse by a spouse. First priority for admission to the project will be given to women without any means of supporting themselves and their children.

In order to fulfill the purposes of the project, the agency will maintain

- a staffed residence at a confidential location
- staff trained to administer intake interviews and to counsel participants
- emergency transportation for participants
- referral network with the Crisis Clinic of Thurston and Mason Counties

B. Rape Relief Services

The two purposes of this project are to assist victims of rape/sexual assault. Second, the project is to educate the community about sexual violence, its causes, and its prevention.

Pertaining to the first purpose, the agency will maintain a group of trained volunteer advocates to serve victims of sexual violence. Services to victims will be available 24 hours a day by referral from the Crisis Clinic. Volunteers will receive training in crisis intervention, medical and legal aspects of rape/sexual assault, and holding of child, male, and incest victims.

Pertaining to the second purpose, the agency will provide public information concerning sexual assault, self-defense, and services available to victims. This information will be disseminated through public speaking and conferences, leaflets and posters, news articles and the like. To assure administrative coordination of Rape Relief Services internally and on a community basis, the YWCA Rape Relief Program will continue one full time administrator position.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract:

Operate a multi-purpose senior center providing social, health and educational services.

Health Services

To make available to senior persons health and medical care services by providing transportation using volunteer drivers and privately owned vehicles within the Lacey, Olympia and Tumwater areas.

Nutrition Education/Health Information

To provide for six community forums dealing with "Better Health, Better Care" issues presented by qualified medical doctors; and an eight session program on dietary habits, proper food preparation and new cooking ideas by a nutritionist; to provide one six-week lipreading course to at least ten senior person.

Coordination of Services Available

To provide for coordination with adjunct senior service programs such as Area Agency on Aging, RSVP, I & A, Senior Community Service Project, Green Thumb Program, nutrition, legal assistance, arts and humanities, senior lounge, and other varied social leisure and recreational programs. Fifty percent of director's time is involved in direct service, referrals and follow up services, program planning and development.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract:

Coordination

To support program which responds individually to housing needs (no rental subsidy) of people with handicaps or disabilities. To maintain and increase the rate of employment of youths, persons with handicaps/disabilities, and low income persons, using necessary supporting services. To maintain and unify adjunct services (including information and referral, transportation, other means by which people can obtain services).

The program should provide housing assistance, assistance in securing transportation, application development assistance, case services and technical assistance.

During each quarter of 1981 South Sound Advocates will help at least 40 handicapped residents of Lacey, Olympia, and Tumwater to obtain necessary services and benefits.

To accomplish this objective South Sound Advocates will:

1. Provide information to disabled persons, agencies, and other people.
2. Do referral in a comprehensive sense using casework techniques to assure adequate contact and follow through.
3. Undertake advocacy to help persons who are handicapped obtain assistance and services to which they are entitled.
4. Respond to requests from agencies for technical assistance.
5. Encourage, develop, and implement efforts to increase inter-agency cooperation.

WORK STATEMENT

To maintain and unify adjunct services (including information and referral, coordination, and other means by which people can obtain services).

Support a program which provides basic services (e.g. food, shelter).

The primary objective of this program is to provide English as a second language for refugees and to provide orientation to the community.

To recruit, train and support volunteers to work in teams with refugees in areas of initial cultural and community orientation and survival English as a Second Language (200 volunteers / 250 refugees).

To encourage supportive involvement of volunteers with refugees in areas of problem solving and facilitating continuation of refugee families in ongoing appropriate educational or training programs in the community.

To conduct ongoing evaluation and updating of materials and methods in classroom instruction.

WORK STATEMENT 1. Services to be provided under contract: Juvenile diversion.

Thurston Youth Services Society provides a community based program for juveniles whose goals are to prevent juvenile delinquency. To meet this objective, Thurston Youth Services Society will accomplish the following:

1. To provide community services work experience to 200 Olympia, Lacey, and Tumwater juvenile offenders who are participating in the juvenile diversion program.
2. The Thurston Youth Services Society, through the juvenile diversion unit, will provide information, referral and coordinate services for 800 young offenders residing in Olympia, Lacey and Tumwater.
3. To provide short-term Crisis Intervention counseling services to youth and their families residing in Olympia, Lacey and Tumwater.
